The candidate will also hold a 25% cross-appointment in another unit that aligns with the candidate's expertise.

Applicants must have their PhD in Religion, Jewish Studies, or a related field conferred by July 30, 2022. Applications are invited in all specializations within Jewish Studies, and applicants whose work focuses on areas such as *Israel*, *Diaspora*, *anti-Semitism*, *or European or American Jewry* are most welcome. Disciplinary areas of interest include, among others, ethnology, arts and *belles lettres*, education, human geography, history, legal history, philosophy, sociology, communications, journalism. Candidates are expected to have pedagogical expertise in modern Hebrew and philological competence in earlier dialects.
